

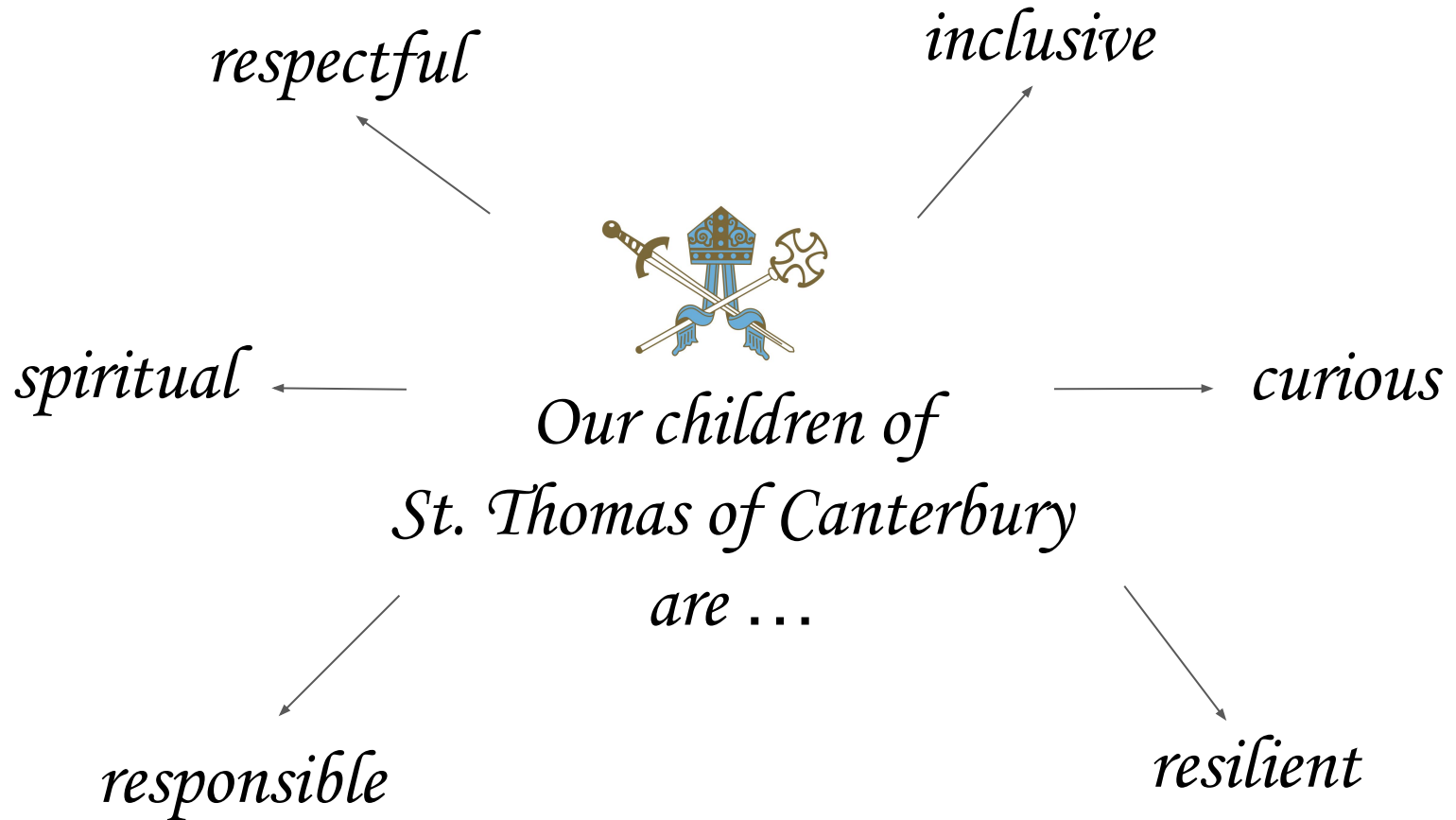

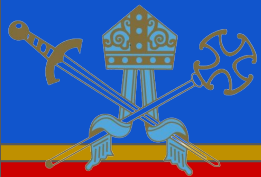

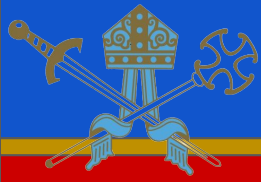

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or runny nose. If they are unwell during the day we shall call you to collect your child.

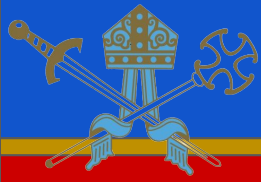
Punctuality

All children should be seated in class by this time.

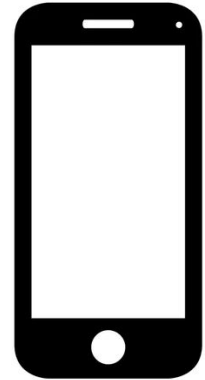
3:10 - Parents arrive to collect.

Absence Procedures

If your child is absent for any reason, you should contact the school office by telephone before 9:00 am on the first day of absence. You will be expected to provide an explanation for the absence and an estimate of how long the absence will last, e.g. one school day.



The law on school attendance has now changed. You will be issued with a penalty notice if your child has ten sessions of unauthorised absence over a rolling period of ten weeks. 10 sessions is equivalent to one week.

At St. Thomas of Canterbury, we are proud that our uniform fosters a sense of belonging within our school community.

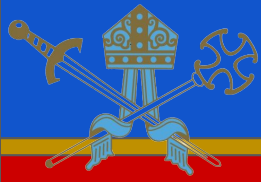

on the weather.**

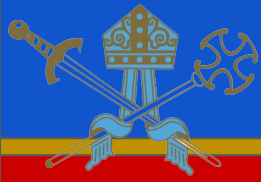
Children should wear

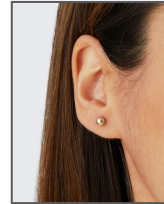

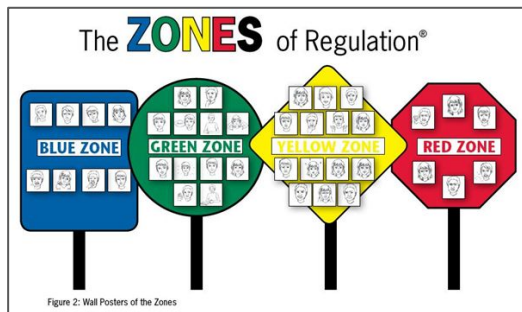




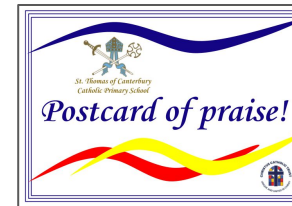

- Prize ceremonies and special assemblies

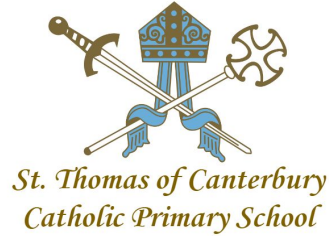

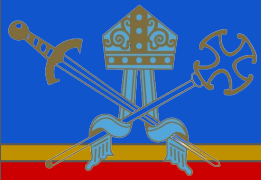

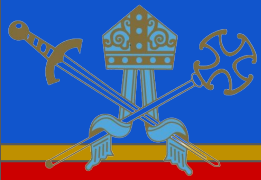


SCHOOL FOCUS Listening

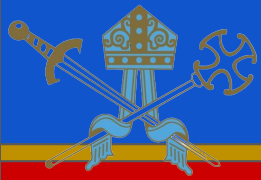
SCHOOL FOCUS Playtime and Lunchtime



This academic year, we have invested in more playground equipment using funds raised from the Year 6 Enterprise Day and the Friends of St Thomas. We have been spending time modelling play to the children; they have even been learning new games suitable for playtime in their PE lessons.

Another focus for us this year is lunchtimes. We are working with the children to promote good table manners and etiquette. We are encouraging them to use this time to talk and listen to their friends at their table as well as being adventurous and trying new foods.





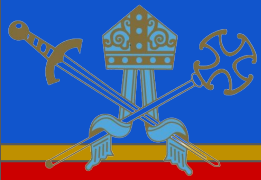
SCHOOL FOCUS- Maths Mastery

This academic year, we have introduced the mastery approach to the teaching and learning of Maths at St Thomas's. Teaching for mastery assumes **everyone** can learn and enjoy mathematics.

A mastery approach means that pupils are taught through whole-class interactive teaching, enabling all to master the concepts taught. In a typical lesson, the teacher leads back and forth interaction, including questioning, short tasks, explanation, demonstration, and discussion, enabling pupils to think, reason and apply their knowledge to solve problems.

Key number facts are learned until they become automatic, and other key mathematical facts are learned deeply and practised regularly.

We have begun to deliver lessons from the programme of study featured in the new Religious Education Directory (RED) entitled *To Know You More Clearly*. Initially, we have launched this new RE curriculum in EYFS and Years 1 & 2, with KS2 following in September 2025.

The six themes, or “branches” of the new curriculum are built around the liturgical calendar. The aim of the updated RED is to enable pupils to become more religiously literate so that they have the knowledge, understanding and skills to reflect spiritually, think ethically and theologically, as well as recognise what religious commitment demands in everyday life.

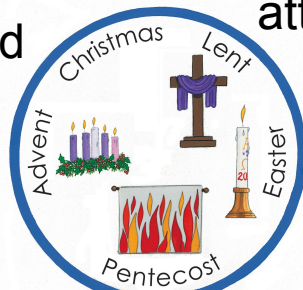
Spring Term - themes and topics

- **Journeys:** How we journey through the seasons of the Liturgical Year
- **Listening and Sharing:** How we listen to and spread God's Word.
- **Giving All:** How Lent is a time of giving.



- Weekly Assembly
- Celebration of the Word
- Musical Celebration of the Word

Mass is celebrated regularly at school and church for the whole school and individual year groups. All parents are welcome to attend.

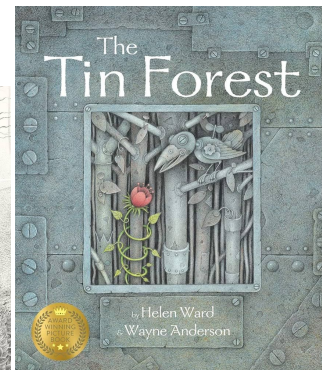
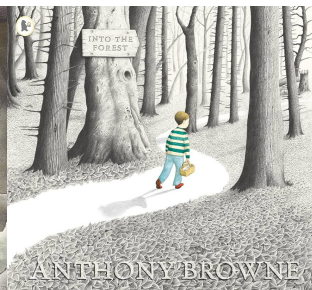
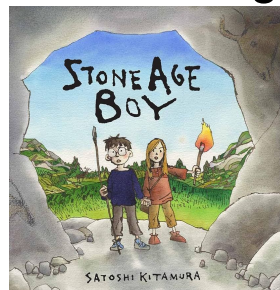




Our learning this term

Throughout the Spring, this is what we will be covering:

English: Children will be using these texts to write setting and character descriptions, narrative pieces, story endings and non-chronological reports.



Maths: Children will be focusing on Multiplication and Division, specifically the relationship between our 2, 4 and 8 Times Tables; scaling by 10; multiplying by 1 2-digit number and also using this knowledge to problem solve.

Science: Children will begin the term learning about forces and magnets. They will learn about magnetic materials and different types of forces. Children will then learn about recycling, which items that can be recycled and why this is important.





Our learning this term

Design & Technology: Children will look at the features of a castle how to create and construct 3D nets in order to create a castle



Art & Design: In Spring 2, children will learn about prehistoric art, exploring different forms of prehistoric art, before creating their own piece.

Computing: This half term, children are learning about the programme Scratch. They will use this coding platform to build skills that enable them to program an animation, a story and a game. They will then learn about the concept of networks, learning how devices communicate.





Our learning this term

French: This half term, children will learn how to say different animals in French as well as how to describe themselves.

In Spring 2, children will learn how to say the days of the week, the months of the year, and count to 30.

History: This half term, children are learning about the late Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age. They will look at how equipment such as weapons and homes changed during these periods, how trade and settlements developed, and how art and culture changed.



Geography: In Spring 2, children will complete a local study. They will be learning to use atlases, globes and maps in more detail, focusing on the area around the school.





Our learning this term

Music: This half term, children will develop an understanding of formal, written notations, as well as looking at improvisation and composition. In Spring 2, children will focus on learning the songs for our Easter Passion performance.

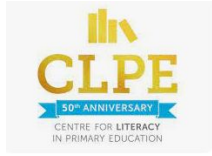
PE: This term, children will learn different techniques in gymnastics, learning how to create and complete a sequence. Children will also learn the rules of basketball. They will explore different ways to pass the ball, as well as learning dribbling and shooting skills.





Reading

Becoming a fluent, skilled and attentive reader starts at the earliest stages. Therefore, making sure that children become engaged with reading at the earliest opportunity is one of the most important ways to make a difference to their life chances.



Books are changed weekly. Please listen to your child read every day and and leave a comment in his/her reading record.





Homework

This term, your child will continue to receive a sheet, which details the homework expectations for each half term. Homework consists of Reading (including a comprehension sheet on Google Classroom) , Spellings and Times Tables.

Occasionally, children may be asked to create a project to present in class.





Educational Visits

Spring 1: Leeds Castle Trip - Friday 17th January.

Leeds Castle is the perfect place for the children to see how a castle is designed to aid them for their DT topic. Children will also take part in a workshop *From Cave to Castle*, looking at what life was like during the Stone Age.



Please note that if we do not receive sufficient contributions towards educational visits, then they may have to be cancelled. Payments are made and consent given via Arbor.

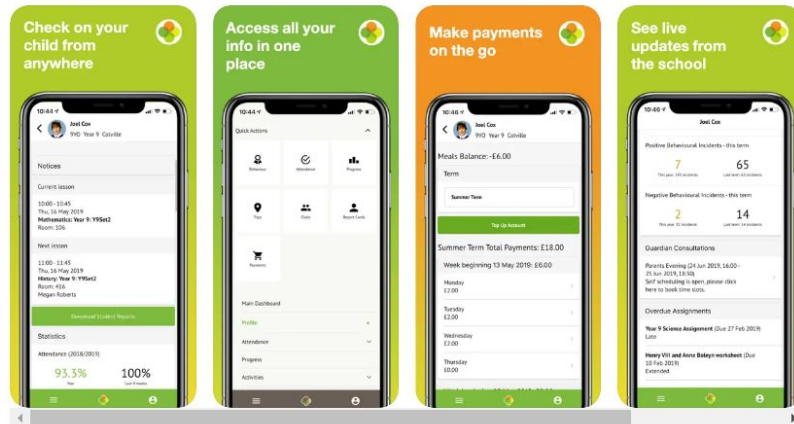

Mrs Foley, our Community Involvement Lead, is leading the establishment of the Friends of St. Thomas of Canterbury.

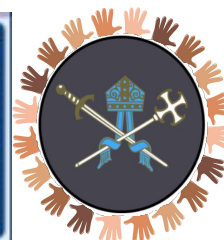
